Overall, UTM CJ majors scored in the following percentiles for each of the assessment indicators during this four year period: UTM mean score: 166, as compared to 150.7 for all other institutions excluding UTM (n=11,121 students). UTM students scored higher in each of the assessment indicators, as will be noted individually below. 85% of students in CJ 200-Introduction to Criminal Justice scored a grade of C or better in the Fall 2013 semester; 67.2% of students in CJ 200 – Introduction to Criminal Justice scored a grade of C or better in the Spring 2014 semester. 100% of students in CJ 460-Criminal Justice Senior Seminar scored a grade of C or better in the Fall 2013 semester; and 94.7% of students scored a grade of C or better in the Fall 2013 semester. 38.46% of students scored above the class mean in Fall 2013 (mean=58.744) on the Practice tests; 52% of students scored above the class mean on the practice tests in Spring 2014 (mean = 61.283) (UTM campus only)	MFT continues each semester – consistent focus on practice tests in CJ Senior Seminar. The CJ 300-Principles of Law Enforcement class is offered early in the student's schedule-the placement timing of this course may be too soon. However, the CJ faculty felt that the addition of a second course focusing on Police Administration offered in conjunction with this course would strengthen the law enforcement concentration and provide students with additional opportunities to focus on law enforcement issues. This course was taught for the first time in the Spring 2014 semester as CJ 405 Law Enforcement Administration.
