#### **VETERAN NEWS**

For years, Veterans have returned home with invisible scars — illnesses and conditions caused by exposure to toxic substances. The passage of the PACT Act (Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics) marked a transformative step in addressing care gaps Veterans were facing after returning home from combat. The PACT Act ensures that Veterans receive the comprehensive, tailored care they have earned. Since August 2022, 5.6 million Veterans have been screened for toxic exposures, and more than 740,000 Veterans have enrolled in VA health care.

#### **HELPING HEROES GRANT**

The grant will be available each year to as many as 375 eligible Veterans on a first-come, first-served basis and will award \$1,000 to students completing at least twelve (12) semester hours each term. Applicants need to have been awarded the Iraq Campaign Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal or the Global War on Terrorism expeditionary Medal. Helping Heroes Grant (tn.gov)

#### MILITARY SCHOLARSHIPS

#### PGA HOPE PROGRAM

HISTORY

Most everyone either remembers where they were at or heard stories of September 11, 2001. This year marks 23 years since one of the most horrendous attacks on the United States. America changed following this event, and many servicemembers and their families would be called upon to adjust their daily routines so servicemembers could deploy in support of finding those responsible. Let us remember the people, families and survivors that are still dealing with the lasting loss of lives due to this somber day.

#### TENNESSEE VETERANS LEGISLATION

#### DISABLED VETERAN LEAVE ENTITLEMENT POLICY

Under the Wounded Warriors Federal Leave Act of 2015 (Public Law 114-75, Nov. 5, 2015), an employee hired on or after Nov. 5, 2016, who is a Veteran with a service-connected disability rating of 30 percent or more from the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) of the Department of Veterans Affairs is entitled to up to 104 hours of disabled veteran leave for the purposes of undergoing medical treatment for such disability.

An eligible employee will receive the appropriate amount of disabled veteran leave as of the employee's "first day of employment," as defined below. Disabled veteran leave is a one-time benefit provided to an eligible employee. The employee will have a single, continuous 12-month eligibility period, beginning on the "first day of employment" in which to use the leave or it will be forfeited with no opportunity to carry over the leave into subsequent years. An employee may not receive a lump-sum payment for any unused or forfeited leave under any circumstance.
